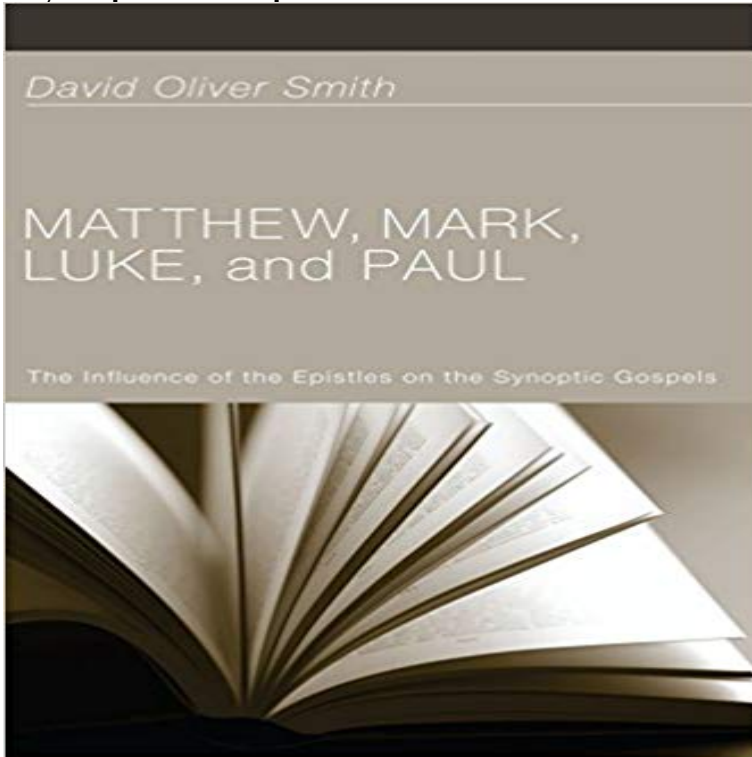


Matthew, Mark, Luke, and Paul: The Influence of the Epistles on the Synoptic Gospels

David Oliver Smith then compares these epistle-based passages to the theoretical lost gospel Q and finds that a large portion of what many New Testament scholars consider to be contained in Q may have its inspiration in the Epistles.
